Bowral Station Street Development

The AGHS branch committee discussed the concerns raised by members about the proposed upgrade/ development of Station Street, Bowral, which will affect trees and shrubs along the street. These trees and shrubs include an avenue of pin oaks (*Quercus palustris*) and a row of heritage camellias.

A letter raising the concerns was sent by Jennifer Carroll on behalf of the branch to the General Manager of Wingecarribee Shire Council, Ms Ann Prendergast. In it she pointed out that the streetscape of the northern part of Station Street is unique in the Southern Highlands because of these plantings—the camellia hedge outside the station car park is an important part of the streetscape, and the pin oaks form an important canopy and welcoming entrance to Bowral.

"Camellias are an unusual streetscape anywhere, and after inspection of the trees/shrubs in Station Street, Dr Stephen Utick, who is one of the three Australian Directors of the International Camellia Society, concluded in his comments on 5 September 2016 that the collection is not only a fine one but important because of aesthetics and the historical influence of Claude Crowe and Berrima Bridge Nursery. As a unique 19th century collection it represents an important part of garden history in the Southern Highlands. The cultivars are all Camellia japonica. They include: Camellia japonica 'Rosa Mundi' 1827, Europe; possibly 'Prince Eugene Napoleon' 1859, Europe, probably from Berrima Bridge Nursery as there are still several bushes on the Nurserv site: 'Orandako' 1739, Japan, which is a rare formal double; 'Aspasia Macarthur' 1848, one of the Camden Park camellias; 'Virginia Franco' 1858, Europe; 'Contessa Woronzoff' 1858; and 'Odoratissima' 1867.

Jenny asked the question whether Council had investigated the origin of these plants. Had they been planted to commemorate an event or a person?

Subsequently we discovered that the pin oaks were indeed planted to commemorate two women who had made an outstanding contribution to Bowral Girl Guides. A plaque on the Springett Commemoration Wall says:

Guiding in Bowral has been a tradition since 1930. Many young girls have enjoyed the friendship, learning and opportunities that guiding has provided. The voluntary efforts of various leaders over the years is (sic) to be commended.

Two women who made an outstanding contribution to Bowral Guides were: the late Miss Sydney Joyce Arnold MBE and Miss Barbara Distin Morgan.

They encouraged girls to be involved in the community and the beautiful "Pin Oak" trees that adorn the side of this Commemoration Wall in Station Street were planted by the Bowral Girl Guides.
