

Most Victorians are not aware that our first Lieutenant Governor, Charles Joseph La Trobe, developed a beautiful garden around his 12½ acre Jolimont estate during the nearly 15 years he spent in Victoria. His home and garden became an oasis for him and his family in this foreign land.

Drawings by Edward La Trobe Bateman give us a flavour of the every-day matters of life at Jolimont in its hey-day, and show how the garden had become a haven of Mediterranean and Australian native plants. Present-day photos of the La Trobe's Cottage garden show some plants we know he grew, through studying the lists of plants sent to him by Ronald Gunn in Van Diemen's Land and the Sydney Botanic Gardens, and some which were named after him. After La Trobe returned to Europe in 1854, his estate was subdivided. The cottage remained until 1964 – its story, leading to its ownership by the National Trust, will be revealed.



Helen Botham has carried out research into garden history for the National Trust and the Australian Garden History Society and was a researcher and contributor to the Oxford Companion to Australian Gardens. Being also a member of the La Trobe Society, and founding chair of the Friends of La Trobe's Cottage, she has a particular interest in the garden La Trobe created at Jolimont and now coordinates the La Trobe's Cottage garden volunteer group. Her book, published in 2006, 'La Trobe's Jolimont – A Walk Around My Garden' uses the illustrations of Edward La Trobe Bateman to give an insight into La Trobe's Jolimont estate and the people who lived there.

OCTOBER QUIZ OLD-FASHIONED FAVOURITES

Springtime means many beautiful blooms appearing in our gardens. This month we thought it might be fun to see if you can recognise some of these lesser known, but old favourites in the photo collage below.



- 1. *Enkianthus quinqueflorus.* A deciduous or semi-evergreen shrub, pink bell-shaped flowers.
- 2. *Pseudotsuga menziesii* 'Hess Select Blue' a good blue foliage form of the Douglas Fir.
- 3. *Garrya elliptica 'James Roof'*. This form has extra long catkins.
- 4. Geranium maderense. Native to Madeira.
- 5. *Edgeworthia gardneri*. Nepal Paper Bush, an evergreen shrub.
- 6. *Luculia grandifolia* deliciously perfumed large white flowers occur through autumn
- 7. *Corylopsis sinensis* var *sinensis* 'Spring Purple' from China.
- 8. Heliotropum sp. Garden Heliotrope
- 9. Primula vulgaris Emglish primrose


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With regard to old fashioned garden favourites, this saucer is decorated with corn flowers. They were the favourite flowers of Marie Antoinette, and were depicted on porcelain for many years after her death, until into the 1830s. The saucer dates from c. 1790, made by the Rue Thiroux porcelain factory in Paris, which was patronised by Marie A. indicated by an impressed crown on the underside,

Corn flowers seem to be more prevalent in Europe than Australia. They are also known as Bachelor's button - to be worn in their button holes by young men in love (or on the market), although I can't say I've ever noticed any.

OCTOBER ADVOCACY

P32675 St Kilda Road - 25 LED installation screens and lighting upgrades

This application by the City of Melbourne is a collaborative push with National Gallery Victoria to install electronic artworks on the centre verge opposite the NGV site. A letter expressing strong objection to the concept and the implementation proposals was submitted to Heritage Victoria, to all CoM councillors and their CEO, on 26th August 2020. The objection centred on the loss of the sense of cultural place created at the confluence of three heritage elements (Domain parklands, St Kilda Boulevard and Arts Precinct) by introduction of clutter and distractions incompatible with appreciation of the grand boulevard. HV have granted the permit for this project (October 5th) with some conditions, principally a reduction in the period of the 'temporary' installation from 25 years to 5, and complete removal at the end of the project. Vic Branch is considering its position on this determination.

City of Glen Eira tree register

Council has passed a Classified Tree Local Law that defines protections for trees on its Classified Tree Register, as well as a permit system to manage the Tree Protection Zones of such trees. Vic Branch wrote to all councillors in support of the initiative.

Fawkner Park Permit Determination by Heritage VictoriaAt a Council meeting in late 2019, the City of Melbourne resolved to request a review by the Heritage Council of the heritage permit refusal for works in Fawkner Park. The Branch made a submission to Heritage Victoria objecting to the proposal which sought to remove the existing basketball court near Pasley Street and construct a new sports court further west of the existing facility, landscaping works, drainage improvement works, selected tree removal and new tree planting works and pathways. These works, on the eastern side of Fawkner Park, would result in an unacceptable detrimental impact on the cultural heritage significance of this site. In mid September 2020 Vic Branch made a follow up submission to the Heritage Council hearing which, after many delays, occurred on 2nd and 5th of October 2020. Vic Branch awaits the determination from HV.
