Editorial Station Street, Bowral

The Station Street 'Upgrade' threatens the beautiful trees which frame the entrance to Bowral from the north.

Although the planners currently say only two of the pin oaks will be cut down, the plans indicate four of the trees will be cut down. In addition, there will be wholesale removal of trees and shrubs (150+) along the length of Station Street while the engineers widen the road to four lanes and build a roundabout at the northern end.

Unfortunately, it is more than likely that several more of the beautiful and historic pin oaks will be irreparably damaged by the construction work.

These trees left undisturbed will normally live for 120 years. Why make a fuss over these trees in particular? Each of them was planted by a schoolchild in 1937 to celebrate the coronation of King George and Queen Elizabeth. The Girl Guides, the Boy Scouts, Bowral High School, Bowral Primary School, Annesley College, the Convent School, O.L.S.H. School and Anglewood School were all represented at the planting ceremony.



AGHS Southern Highlands organised a demonstration on 22 May 2018 when fifty people turned up in Station Street to tie ribbons on the threatened pin oaks. Meg Probyn was interviewed on ABC Illawarra at 7.00 am and also by Win TV when they came to film the demonstration. The edited news item shown on TV that evening was a travesty as they gave more time to an interview with one of the Wingecarribee Councillors who also happens to be a developer.

Numerous AGHS members have had letters published in Southern Highland News.

There are so many issues to be resolved before the Council can proceed. AGHS is concerned that Council doesn't own or control all the land that it needs to build the roundabout and the road through the station carpark. The cost is an overspending of the funds originally allocated—the increase in the estimate for Stage 1 from \$9.5 million to the current \$15.075 million, 59% more than the figure the Council had in front of it when it voted to proceed to tender on 14thFebruary.

The community feels frustrated that Council hasn't allowed debate at the Council meetings to answer pertinent questions, such as:

- Where is an updated economic benefit analysis?
- Exactly which trees are going to be destroyed and which ones are at serious risk?
- Has RMS (Roads and Maritime Services) given approval for the new proposed roundabout?

And a critical one:

• Will Council honour its commitment to a Review of Environmental Factors for the Station Street Upgrade—a commitment made on several occasions to the community?

This is an on-going battle and will not be resolved for some time. A Facebook page called '**Friends of Bowral**' has been launched to keep everyone up-to-date with developments.

AGHS Winter Seminar 24 June 2018

The Southern Highlands presented our members and guests with a sparkling and sunny Winter's day for the Winter seminar held on Sunday 24 June. Visitors from Berry and Canberra joined local members and their guests at the Bradman Centre during the afternoon to hear our guest speakers Leonie Norton and Dr Stephen Utick, and to join them in afternoon tea.

Leonie is a botanical artist and a leading artist in her field. She is an international tutor and author of the book *Women of Flowers: Botanical Art in Australia* from the 1830s to the 1960s. One of the book's chapters is devoted to Marrianne Collinson Campbell (1827-1903), the subject of Leonie's presentation.



Marrianne came from a family of talented amateur watercolour artists. Her own talent, her love for flora and fauna and her eye for detail were encouraged by her father and aunt, and by her teacher Conrad Martens. Following her marriage to George Campbell she lived at Campbell's Cove, now part of The Rocks area in Sydney, until 1857 when she and her family moved to Duntroon, the Campbell family home which George had inherited. Duntroon is now part of Canberra and the suburb of Campbell is named after George's father Robert.



Marrianne transformed the house into an imposing two-storey Gothic revival home and she redesigned the gardens. They included exotic and rare blooms, trees from England and the Australian native plants Telopea speciosissima, various Eucalyptus and Callistemon species.

Marrianne continued to paint native plants from Western Australia, the Blue Mountains and Moreton Bay,but the majority of her work reflected the trees and flowers in and around Duntroon and Sydney.

When she was sixteen Marrianne began compiling an album *Wildflowers, Fruit and Butterflies of Australia* and she continued to add paintings to the album until 1883. It is now held by the National Library in Canberra. Her other albums are held by her family in Australia and Scotland.

Dr Stephen Utick is an Australian Director for the International Camellia Society (ICS), the inaugural Chair of the ICS Committee of Historic Camellia Preservation and the founder of Camellia Ark Australia. Dressed in his beautifully embroidered camellia vest Stephen entertained and enlightened us with ten wonderful stories which illustrated the significance of the camellia in garden history.



Stephen took us from gardens in China where the camellia is worshipped as a divinity to the towering reticulatas of the Zhang Garden in Old Dali. Yunnan Province; through the delicate wood blocks and screen paintings of the Edo period in Japan to the artistry of bonsai camellias; to the camellias of Galicia in Spain and the white camellias given out to supporters in 1893 by the New Zealand suffragette Kate Sheppard; to the purity of the white camellia chosen by Coco Chanel in 1925 as a symbol of culture and fashion.

We finished the afternoon with questions and spoke of the significance to the Southern Highlands of the camellias planted in Station Street Bowral, and the threat they are under if plans to widen the street go ahead.

Marrianne Collinson CAMPBELL, nee CLOSE (1827 - 1903)

Born 30 June 1827 Hunter Valley, NSW. Died Duntroon, now ACT, 2 May 1903.

Marrianne Close was born on 30 June 1827 in the village of Green Hills in the Hunter Valley of New South Wales. She was one of nine children and the only surviving daughter of Lieutenant Edward Close and his wife, Sophia. Marrianne had a passion for flora and fauna and, with an eye for detail, she recorded many Australian wildflowers.

Lieutenant Close, a talented watercolour artist, gave his daughter lessons in drawing and painting, while Marrianne's great-aunt Sophia nurtured her work. In her early teens, Marrianne took lessons from the artist Conrad Martens, who influenced her meticulous painting style.

In 1854, Marrianne married her second cousin, 36-year-old George Campbell, who had inherited the family home of Duntroon, near what is now Canberra, in 1846. They lived at Wharf House in Campbell's Cove, now part of The Rocks area of Sydney, until 1857, when Marrianne, George and their two children moved to Duntroon.

As a widow in her late fifties, Marrianne devoted much of her time to painting. Many of her albums are still treasured as valuable heirlooms among family in Australia and Scotland.

Marrianne died at Duntroon on 2 May 1903, at the age of 75, and was buried among other Campbell family members in a dedicated enclosure at St John's Church in Canberra, of which she was a benefactor.

The house at Duntroon did not remain in the Campbell family after Marrianne's death.

After the creation of Canberra as the national capital, the Australian Government acquired the estate and 370 acres (1.5 km2) of land. In 1911, the Royal Military College of Australia was founded at Duntroon, and the original house became the Officers' Mess.

Save the Dates for Our Tours in 2019

Planning is underway for two tours in 2019:

From 3-5 April 2019 we will visit the South Coast where the highlight of this tour will be Horse Island located in Tuross Lake and acknowledged as a benchmark for landscaping with a diversity of native plants and something in flower every week of the year. We will also visit Merribee Gardens - 7 acres of sensory pleasure at Numbaa near Nowra with diverse plantings of trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants and formal garden rooms. Among the other attractions on this tour will be the garden of well known AGHS member and plant collector Hazel King, Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Gardens and a lunch cruise on the Clyde River.
