An Honorary Professorial Fellow in the School of Botany at The University of Melbourne, Tim has been a Visiting Professor in the School of Biological and Biomedical Science, Durham University. We are delighted that he has agreed to open the Conference in October and to be the Guest Speaker at the dinner, where we will also have the opportunity to meet his wife, Lynda.

While the committee's main focus has been on the National Conference, plans are well advanced for two tours next year, thanks to the indefatigable Ray Bradley. The Events team is also planning the Christmas party, the Jazz Picnic and winter activities. AGHS Annual General Meeting 25 August 2018

Beyond Exploration; Illustrating the Scientific Legacy of Ludwig Leichardt.

Tanya Hoolihan, our morning guest speaker at the AGM, took us on her journey of adventure and discovery. After graduating with a Bachelor of Natural History Illustration degree (Honours) from the University of Newcastle she needed a subject for her Ph. D research. Various incidents; including a special guided walk around the Sydney Botanic Gardens, and extensive reading led her to her subject; the plants that Leichardt found and recorded. Tanya researched Leichardt's plant specimens using the Sydney and Melbourne Herbariums, and this research she married with references taken from Leichardt's diaries, written in High German and only recently translated into English and published.





Tanya identified each plant mentioned, its location and the date Leichardt found the specimen. Tanya has created an electronic database of over 3000 of these plants correlating the diary and herbarium collections. Her own field work also took her on journeys that Leichardt himself took over 170 years ago. This has led her to identify threatened and extinct species. This meticulous work is beautifully enhanced by 17 botanical illustrations which members were able to look at, explore and admire the fine detail.

AGHS Annual General Meeting 25 August 2018

Experiences at a week-long symposium: "The Art of Gardening" at Great Dixter, East Sussex, England

Following a delicious lunch we settled in to hear Susan Hand and Colin Blanch chat about the week they

spent at Great Dixter. The conversation topics were led by Ralph Suters, Susan's partner, and were accompanied by his superb slides of the particular topic under discussion.

Susan commenced by describing Great Dixter – in the early 1900s Lutyens combined an existing mid-15th century house with a similar structure brought from Kent – the combination has the appearance of a medieval manor. The garden was then developed by Christopher Lloyd over 40 years and is currently managed by Fergus Garrett who worked with Lloyd as Head Gardener and whose knowledge and humour played a large part in the week's success.

On the first day, we saw the group of twelve walking through the wild flower meadow. This stirred the audience to comment on the possibility of snakes - Colin commented that it would be impossible to have such a meadow with similar plants under Australian conditions.



Of special mention were workshops on succession planting, soil improvement, composting, staking and tying, nursery propagation and a day at the RHS Hampton Court Palace Flower Show. Delicious home grown food rated highly.

Susan closed the chat by commenting on her total enjoyment of the week – however when asked if she would return replied "no" as another experience might not reach her expectations. Whereas Colin returns each year as he says there is always more to learn.

Australian Garden History Society (Southern Highlands Branch) Tour

Horse Island and the South Coast

Wednesday 3 – Fríday 5 Apríl 2019

Day 1 - Wednesday 3 April 2019

The tour will commence with a visit to Oke's Camellia Garden - a plant collector's garden. Graeme has travelled to China and Vietnam where he collected many different specimens. The property has trees dating from the 1860's and Camellia trees moved from Bomaderry to Broughton Vale 41 years ago. There is about 4 acres of garden to explore.

After morning tea at Oke's Camellia Garden we will visit *Avia Hortus* the garden belonging to well known AGHS member, local gardening identity and plant collector Hazel King. Features of this garden include the diversity and intensity of plantings which are both interesting and unusual.

Lunch - Merribee Gardens



After lunch we will have a guided tour of **Merribee's garden** which spans seven acres and features 2km of pathways. Wander through formal garden rooms, including the Rose Garden, the hedged Potager, the walled Snow Pear Garden, the Cottage Garden, Crepe Myrtle Walk, the Herb Garden, the Lavender Paddock, the Bunya Bunya Copse and finish up at the adjoining hedging, topiary and rose nursery. Birdlife is vibrant in the garden. In the orchard edible fruit ranges from mango, guava and apple to pomegranate, passionfruit and avocados. The garden is also home to beehives that yield Merribee honey.

Day 2 - Thursday 4 April 2019



To-day we will visit picturesque Horse Island which sits in Tuross Lake bounded on one side by the narrow Brices Creek which allowed the construction of an old hardwood bridge and vehicular access. The island is a natural formation of a horseshoe shaped landmass around Horse Island Bay. The garden is extensive covering around 20 acres. We will have the opportunity to see the area which includes the surrounds of the main buildings including the main house at the northern end and two cottages on either side of the road "guarding" the southern entry. To the northeast, across the lake, a distant line of Norfolk Island pines alludes to the beachfront at Tuross Head, and the ocean beyond. To the northwest the vista across a wide body of water is to dense eucalypt forest and the majestic misty mountains of the Deua National Park.

The garden was developed from Australian native plants as the east coast Australian landscapes provided an understated parkland with drifts of native grasses between clumped trees. It was recognised that a balance would need to be achieved with controlled landscapes near the buildings easing into informal patterns of planting merging with the bush. As the garden evolved a dam was turned into an elegant water feature. The immediate environs of the main house are formally planned with a rill, circular pond, curving colonnade and lushly planted border recalling great English prototypes but created from Australian native plants.



Lunch - Picnic lunch at Horse Island

Returning to Batemans Bay we will make a stop at Mogo which, since the 1980's, has become home to a small group of artists and craftspeople. The town's architectural heritage has been maintained with shops and dwellings being built to compliment the surviving miners' cottages. These buildings are now galleries and speciality shops brimming with traditional and modern art, exotic and unusual artefacts, and, ceramics, collectables, antiques and cafes.

Dinner - Lincoln Downs Resort

Day 3 - Friday 5 April 2019

This morning we will visit **Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Gardens** a site of approximately 42 hectares (*about 100 acres*) and part of Mogo State Forest, adjacent to Deep Creek Dam. The site had not been logged since the early years of the twentieth century. About 10 hectares was cleared and excavated providing fill for the dam wall. That degraded area provided an excellent site for the buildings and display gardens of Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Gardens. The remaining 32 hectares of natural forest vegetation provided an ideal environment for walking tracks.

Lunch - River Cruise on the Clyde River (Batemans Bay)



The Clyde River (Bhundoo to the local Aboriginal people), begins its journey 125 km from Batemans Bay in rugged mountain areas to the north. The Clyde River, which is sometimes merely a trickle in the upper reaches, passes through pristine forest areas and National Parks delivering water that is very pure. As the river nears Batemans Bay it becomes much wider and deeper with the last 35km from Shallow Crossing to the Tollgate Islands at the entrance to Batemans Bay being navigable to large watercraft. Its sources are almost entirely contained in protected, uninhabited lands (primarily National Parks)

with only 5% of its catchment being cleared. It is one of the last major rivers in Eastern Australia to remain un-dammed. A short stop is made at Nelligen with time to visit local historical sites including where the notorious Clarke Brothers were held waiting shipment to Sydney

Traffic and weather permitting we should return to the Southern Highlands at approximately 5.30pm.
