Australian Garden History Society members will be saddened to learn of the death of Dr Lise Summers. A former member of the Society, Lise was senior archivist at the State Records Office for over twenty years. After graduating from UWA, Lise undertook further studies at the University of NSW and Edith Cowan University before completing her PhD at the University of Melbourne. Her thesis 'From Wasteland to Parkland' is a seminal reference on the development of Perth's public gardens and open spaces. Lise's studies in this field, coupled with her intimate knowledge of the resources of the State Records Office, made her advice on a number of the Society's projects invaluable. Her friendly and knowledgeable assistance was much appreciated. She will be sadly missed.

In 2009 Lise showed a group of members through the workings of the State Records Office, and in April 2015 she a gave a well-attended talk Naturally Urbane: parks in the city at the Grove Community Centre.

Annual General Meeting, John Viska

The 30th AGM took place at Falls Farm, Lesmurdie on 11th August with 24 members and a guest in attendance. Prior to the meeting members enjoyed a stroll in the grounds, maintained by Heritage Roses in Australia.

As a result of community action in the mid-1980s, Falls Farm, part of the Sanderson Estate, was saved from demolition. The surviving building, constructed from the local lateritic rock, with its north facing veranda covered by an aged vine was one of the earliest farmsteads in the area. Remnant productive plants including a fig, loquats and a vine covered pergola were surrounded by degraded bushland. Neil and Pauline Tonkin, ably assisted by the Lesmurdie Ratepayers Association, applied for community grants and in conjunction with fundraising field days raised the capital to restore the derelict cottage. A heritage rose garden was designed and with the assistance of Bentley TAFE students the paved area installed. Roses, the result of community members buying a plant from a selection made by the committee, were planted in the cruciform rose garden. The WA branch of Heritage Roses in Australia

tend the roses and recently have planted climbers to grow over the pergola. Volunteers assist with the garden and the property is a popular venue as well as functioning as a community centre. In recognition of the superb effort by the late Neil Tonkin the site has been named Neil Tonkin Park.

In a matter of weeks, several WA Branch members will be winging their way across to Wellington, New Zealand to join other Australians and our New Zealand "cousins" in the floral feast that awaits us in the 40th National Conference, "Expanding Horizons" 25th to 27th October. There are still places available for those who may be interested in attending, although the pre and post-conference garden tours, led by AGHS member, Stuart Read, are fully booked. The larger South Island tour with Lyn Walker is still available and is a great opportunity to see some major historic gardens in this glorious region of New Zealand.

Work is underway on both the 2020 Conference in Sydney and the 2021 Conference in Hobart. There are a lot of hard working volunteers in AGHS undertaking the responsibility of preparation and presenting national conferences, something which we can all enjoy and participate in.

To keep pace with the nation's CPI, it was proposed and agreed at the last NMC meeting on 26 August, 2019, to increase membership fees. There has been no increase in membership for many years but our management and publication costs have definitely done so. Proposed membership increases are based on the individual rate rising from \$72 to \$78.

The WA Branch was successful in securing a \$10,000 grant from the NMC 40th Anniversary Fund for the project proposed to mark the 2020, 40th Anniversary of the founding of the AGHS. This will contribute to the production of a book which will combine the work undertaken in 2011 and 2018 on the exhibitions, Heritage Gardens of Perth. Work is underway on combining the text and photographic research into a major publication which will be the first major historic work of this kind on gardening, nurseries and public gardens in Perth.

22nd March, 2020 is the date for our Garden Party celebration which will see all branches across Australia, gather in a local garden of significance at the same time (across our time zones!) to toast and commemorate the founding of the AGHS. Recent Events

History in the City, Royal Western Australian Historical Society, 3rd July, John Viska, Chair AGHS WA

The chairman delivered an illustrated talk on the Society's recent exhibition *Historic Gardens* of *Perth, Western Suburbs*. The presentation was for the RWAHS program, *History in the City* with 35 people attending. This is the fourth time the talk has been requested by community groups and received a positive response.

Berkshire Valley, Clinch Farm, Mill and Museum, 11th July, Theresa Putland The Moora Historical Society hosted 32 AGHS WA members and friends who enjoyed the Society's excellent museum in the town which was followed by a visit to Clinch Farm in the Berkshire Valley.

In Moora we received a warm welcome and tour of the beautifully displayed historical material collected by the people of Moora. This was followed by a light lunch which was provided by members of the Society. At lunch, notes detailing nineteenth century gardening events at Berkshire Valley were presented by the Chairman.

The group then drove out to Berkshire Valley and the Clinch Farm. The farm is only open once a year or on request to the present owners, Jill and Fred Hamilton. Prior to inspecting the six heritage listed buildings on the property which was established in the 1840s, Fred gave a detailed history of the walled courtyard garden which research has shown is a rare example extant in WA.

Clinch Mill is managed by the Moora Historical Society and provides displays of Clinch family memorabilia. The group toured the many historic buildings, large courtyard garden and the triple arched bridge. It was an excellent day, not only because of the uniqueness of Berkshire Valley Farm, but also due largely due to the tireless efforts of Kaye Lewis and the members of the Moora Historical Society.

From wildflower rooms to bush fire photography, the show both celebrates the natural beauty of landscapes and plants, and raises bracing issues about environmental destruction and the land rights of Australia's First Peoples. 2019 in Review, Sue Monger

Our Christmas function last year began with a walk in the Mosman Park Memorial Gardens with former Mayor Ron Norris as our guide talking about the Avenue of Honour and the other war memorials before we repaired to the Mosman Park Golf Club where we celebrated the 30th anniversary of the WA branch. A cake was cut by John Viska, Tessa Watson, Caroline Grant and Sue Monger all of whom have held the Chairman's position.

In April we partnered with Heritage Roses in Australia and the Woodbridge Volunteers to present Roses of Woodbridge: Heritage Roses from Charles Harper's Nursery. Harper's nursery and commercial orchard operated between 1894 and 1915. There were superb floral displays throughout the house and the billiard room featured a display of roses from the

original catalogue that are still available today. Over the weekend more than 950 people took the opportunity to enjoy this feature of the National Heritage Festival.

Gillian Lilleyman's book Pioneer Daughter; The Diary of Frances Louisa Drake (Fanny) Brockman (nee Bussell) provided the basis for Gillian's illustrated talk 'Pioneer Hostess'. In the late 19th Century Fanny provided accommodation at her home Burnside for the growing numbers of tourists to the caves in the Margaret River region. Her brother John at Walcliffe House and her sister Edith at Ellensbrook also catered for visitors to the area.

In July, on a glorious winter's day, we ventured to Moora to visit a wonderful regional museum and enjoy lunch provided by members of the Moora Historical Society. Berkshire Valley Farm was established by James Clinch in the 1840's and it was a self-sufficient village with stone woolshed, stables, piggery, residence and mill which now houses a museum. The Hamilton family are the current owners of the property.

There will be a small contingent of WA members at the National Conference to be held in Wellington, NZ in late October.
