

This day of garden visits south of Hobart includes three very different gardens and landscapes: a historic mountain retreat, a productive garden and a contemporary suburban garden. We begin at the grand gardens of High Peak on the slopes of kunyani/Mt Wellington, then travel south to the world's southernmost tea plantation at Allens Rivulet before visiting a delightful suburban garden at Kingston.

HIGH PEAK, 1122 HUON ROAD, NEIKA

High Peak is located at Neika, a sub-alpine environment on the slopes of kunyani/Mt Wellington. Charles Grant built High Peak as a mountain retreat in 1892 and the extensive gardens were started soon after, their early establishment evidenced by the many huge old trees, especially conifers, and the old cypress hedges. The Victorian Tudor style house was designed by George Fagg, a prominent architect of the time, most known for his church buildings, including the chancel and chapel of St David's Cathedral, Hobart. The significant gardens thrive in Neika's rich volcanic soil and high rainfall, which is twice that of Hobart. Some of the rare species include monkey-puzzle trees (*Araucaria araucana*), native to the Chilean Andes. There are also other araucarias, sequoias, spruce, cedar, Norfolk Island pine, cypress, yew and yellow holly. Many of the conifers were bought by Charles Grant from the Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens about 130 years ago. The formal gardens include English box and pittosporum hedges, hydrangeas and rhododendrons.

Charles Grant's great grandson, Jim Grant and his wife Annabelle now own High Peak and are expanding the gardens with plantings which focus on Tasmanian natives, including Tasmanian conifers.

TASSIE-T, 3 KADINA CLOSE, ALLENS RIVULET

Tassie-T, also known as Dry Ideas and Scientific Horticulture, began as a research project led by Dr Gordon Brown for the Department of Agriculture over 30 years ago. It is now a family business owned by Dr Brown, his wife Jane a food technologist and daughter Charlotte, a business graduate. Tassie-T grows, processes and packages their natural and pesticide-free green and black tea at Allens Rivulet.

The tea plants are *Camellia sinensis*, with the original plants being sourced from Japan. *Camellia sinensis* grows more slowly in Tasmania than in the warm, humid tea-growing regions of the northern hemisphere. Hence the yield is lower.

SOJOURN, 173 REDWOOD ROAD, KINGSTON

Sojourn is a large suburban garden with a variety of unusual and interesting plants. Owners Nicole and Stuart Clutterbuck, who are donating the funds raised by our visit to charity, have provided the following description of their garden:

Our garden is a one acre or 4 000sqm relaxed family garden. We purchased the property in September 2000 and have designed and created all that you see now. The style is mainly English but with many diverse elements.

All the rocks in the garden have come from friends as we had none on the property. There is a computerised watering system and heavy mulching which help to combat the naturally sandy soil. We maintain the garden ourselves and enjoy sharing it with you. Please feel free to walk around all the paths including those close to the house. Thank you for visiting.
